<u>CLASS RULES</u> So that you can learn and I can teach, I have a set of rules to ensure we have an orderly and successful classroom.

Important rules to consider:

- Much of the coursework will be accessible digitally. It is expected that you will bring your charged laptop to class each day. We will use it daily.
- Phone use: No phones, no earbuds. Pouch your phone when you enter the classroom: your pouched phone will be used for attendance. Communicate with me if you need it for an emergency
- For each unexcused tardy expect to have 3 points deducted from your timeliness: check power school if you're wondering how it is affecting your grade. Be on time.

These consequences may be modified based on severity of infraction.

CLASS PROCEDURES

Procedures are important for creating an effective and successful learning environment.

Start of class and end of class: You are expected to review the day's learning targets and complete any warm up task when you enter the classroom. Often this will be done in Google Classroom, so have your laptops ready. I use the last few minutes of class to review the day's lesson and remind you of upcoming due dates. You will be dismissed after these announcements.

Notes: You will often take notes (lecture notes or Cornell notes). If you are absent, you are responsible for requesting the notes from another student or see me for a copy. Information from your notes, as well as all of your assignments, are important for your unit tests.

Homework/assignments: need to be done at the beginning of class to be considered on time.

Late work: You begin with a bank of points called "Timeliness" (30 points) for the trimester. For each assignment turned in late, 3 points will be taken from this total.

Absences: You have the amount of days you were absent to turn in assignments for full credit. **You are responsible for REOUESTING the missed work from me *before* or *after school*. If you have missed a quiz or test, you have one week to make it up. You need to schedule a time to make up quizzes and tests.

· Missing work due to absences or traveling will be a zero until made up. You will be given credit for the assignment when it is turned in.
